





Hello Villagers,

The winter months seem to be yielding to the promise of spring. At least that is how it felt this morning at 6am as we watered the plants in our greenhouse. New annuals are sprouting from seeds, cuttings are taking roots, potting mix is scattered over the floor and the tropical and annuals have withstood their temporary winter quarters in the greenhouse waiting for outside hardening in April.

In the Village Hall, we are also feeling the promise of spring and new beginnings. I am excited that Dixon Morgan has agreed to serve as Village Treasurer to fill the open position. Dixon brings decades of investment experience and will be key in shaping our investment policies in this higher interest rate environment. I am pleased that the Village's appointment of Dr John Kramer and Mitchell Bass to the Land Conservancy Board reflects a wonderful combination of John's many years of experience and Mitchell's fresh ideas and passion for arboriculture.

The beginning of the Village's third century in 2026 will be guided by the findings, ideas and suggestions developed by hundreds of Villagers over the last several years in town halls, surveys, and interviews. I thank each of you for your contributions to the planning process. Council and I have agreed that the findings will be addressed by groupings of operational items (i.e. improving recycling) and of strategic items (i.e. the tree canopy). The operational items will be addressed primarily by the mayor and his staff in their operation of the village. The strategic items will be addressed in council workshops to focus on these key elements of our future. The workshops will be open to the public and live-streamed. I am optimistic that this approach will yield a productive path forward.

I am finalizing committee composition this month. If you have an interest in working on a committee, let me know. In collaborating with each other, we will move the Village forward.

Start the month by participating in the Community Club's pancake breakfast on March 3. Enjoy the final month of winter and hope for an early Spring.

From Your Police Department: Welcome to Tax Season!! As a result, from March 3 through March 9 is National Consumer Protection Week (NCPW).

As we all know, this is the time of the year that criminal imposters are in full force looking to prey upon unsuspecting victims. Below are some valuable tips from the Cuyahoga County Department of Consumer Affairs that can help you avoid becoming a victim. To report a scam or register a complaint see their website at https://www.cuyahogacounty.gov/consumeraffairs.

- > Smartphone users should always log out of apps (banking, social networking, etc.), clear their browser history, password protect their home screen, update operating software and NEVER share data over public Wi-Fi networks.
- Use a credit card when shopping by phone, television or online—not a debit card, so you can dispute the charge if there are problems within 60 days from receipt of the bill.
- Do not respond to emails, text messages, mail or phone calls claiming you won a prize, gift card, lottery, grant or other unexpected surprise. It is a scam! The scammers are relying on you to log in with your user's name and password or click on the link provided in the unexpected email or text message. Con artists look for you to give out your name, address, account numbers over the phone or press the number to opt out from future calls. Why? To collect your information, sell it or use it to commit fraud.
- > Read monthly statements on accounts and bills to ensure all charges are accurate and no hidden fees appear. Dispute any errors immediately.
- > Get and review your free credit reports once every 12 months from each of the three nationwide consumer credit reporting companies at www.annualcreditreport.com.
- If you received any gift cards, certificates, social or group discount coupons go ahead and set a date for dinner, movie or shopping with plans to use them. Check expiration dates on the discount coupons.
- > Shred documents that contain any personal information.
- And remember: If it sounds to good to be true, it probably is a scam!

And finally, I would like to Congratulate Patrolman Arch Kimbrew on his 25-year work anniversary working in the Village. Patrolman Kimbrew serves the community as the School Resource Officer (SRO) during the school year, and covers the road during the summer months during peak vacation season. Arch is a dedicated public servant and has been the recipient of commendations from the Village, and also from the State of Ohio for his work in the schools.

THINK SPRING AND SAFETY!

March, and springtime in general, is a busy time when it comes to Emergency Preparedness.

March 17, 2024, through March 23, 2024, is severe weather week. It is your chance to upgrade and practice your family safety plan before an event occurs. Planning is the key to keeping your family safe and to recover from an event quickly.

For some great information on severe weather and emergency preparedness, visit www.weathersafety.ohio.gov. On March 20, 2024, at 9:50 a.m. there will be a **Statewide Tornado Drill**. This drill will include the use of warning sirens, the Emergency Alert System (EAS), and our local **Ready Notify/Code Red** notification system. If you have registered you will receive any combination of either a text message, voice mail (or phone call), or an email.

A Tornado Watch means a tornado is possible.

A Tornado Warning means a tornado is happening or imminent. Take shelter immediately.

Don't forget to change your clocks along with your Smoke alarm and Carbon Monoxide alarm batteries during March. When you change your batteries, check the manufacture date of your detectors! Smoke detectors must be replaced every 10 years, and Carbon Monoxide detectors must be replaced every 6 to 7 years. According to the National Fire Protection Association, having a working smoke alarm cuts the chances of dying in a reported fire in half. Almost two-thirds of home fire deaths resulted from fires in homes with no smoke alarms or no working smoke alarms. If you don't have working smoke alarms, please contact me by phone or email. The fire department has a Smoke alarm and Carbon Monoxide alarm installation program available to all Gates Mills residents.

There is a new requirement to include the area code when dialing. If you have a monitored security or fire alarm system, you need to confirm that your alarm is being transmitted successfully. Some systems weren't programmed to dial the area code, which means the alarm won't be received. Contact your monitoring company today to have them run a test on your alarm system!

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Dear Villagers,

Please enjoy reading a little history of the Society from *IN OUR OWN VOICES*, by The Gates Mills Historical Society.

GATES MILLS IMPROVEMENT SOCIETY

On October 21, 1905, The Gates Mills Improvement Society was incorporated as a non-profit corporation by Frank Ginn, E. S. Wright, S. Prentiss Baldwin, Edwin H. Cady, F. E. Wettstein, F. T. Sholes and A. G. Frisbie. The first officers of the Society were S. Prentiss Baldwin as President, A. Ward Foote as Vice-President, and Evelyn Wright as Secretary and Treasurer.

The purpose of the corporation was to promote the health, safety and happiness of members of The Society, to improve and protect property in Mayfield Township, and to acquire, hold, use, lease or convey such real estate as necessary to achieve these goals.

On December 1905, The Maple Leaf Land Company deeded to The Society three parcels it owned for parks. One is the present Polo Field west of Epping Road, the second is the mill race from the river to the old right of way for the Cleveland and Eastern Railroad Company, and the third is a strip of land along the west bank of the river from the dam southward to the parcel owned by Corliss Sullivan.

The Society was the governing body of the town until The Village of Gates Mills was incorporated in 1920. The Society's early committees reflected the community's interests of the time: Parks, Good Roads, Forestry, School, and Dam Improvement. Over the decades all of the Society's efforts have centered on the improvement of village life, whether acting alone or in cooperation with other organizations.

The most recognizable efforts of The Society are the Fourth of July Parade and Ceremony on the Polo Field and The Annual Employee Christmas Fund. Additionally, The Society supports the Animal Welfare Committee, Tennis Program, funding for Christmas Eve gathering and bonfire, special meetings of Village interests, and the Annual Dinner in January at The Hunt Club.

The newest item in the shop is a monograph by former Mayor Dan Collister. A Life in Gates Mills. Dan tells more tales of the Village's heyday including when they moved the river. 

Recycling Updates: Light for Lions and Paper Collection Reminders

Dear Villagers -

I am happy to report that this year's collection for Lights for Lions was another **roaring** (couldn't help it) success. Thanks to you all, we collected almost 300 pounds of broken



While on the topic of recycling collections, after my 478th trip to the Village to recycle all the Amazon boxes I amassed during the holidays, I noticed a few things that I thought merited some quick reminders on what you can and cannot recycle in the paper bins behind the Community House:

Do Recycle:

- Newspapers for those of you who have never seen nor heard of one, these are periodical publications containing printed information about current events that are delivered to the bottom of your grandparents driveway.
- Junk mail and envelopes Even if they have those plastic film windows that display the address, they can be recycled too.
- Cereal and dry food boxes
- Pizza boxes Yes you can and should recycle pizza boxes.
 Their tops and edges are perforated so you can tear the greasy parts off and recycle the parts that are clean and dry.
- Office paper
- Soft cover books
- Flattened cardboard Ever wonder why it needs to be flattened? It is an extra step but if you've taken the effort to drive it to a collection bin, hopefully its one you are willing to take. Flattening cardboard helps to save room in the bins, allowing for more material to be collected and reduces the space needed to transport the material and helps increase the productivity of the recycling process.
- Phone books Actually, never mind. If you still have one of these on hand, alert the National Archives.

Do Not Recycle:

- Wet or soiled paper and boxes
- Used napkins, tissue or paper towels
- Paper receipts Due to the plastic coating, these cannot be recycled.
- Food or candy wrappers These are often made of mixed materials that also cannot be recycled.
- **Shredded paper** Its too small to make it through the sorting systems at the recycling facilities. It also makes a mess.
- **Bundled paper** All items should be loose since twine or rope can entangle the equipment at recycling facilities, leading to costly repairs or even shutting down operations.
- **Hammocks** I actually saw one left by the bins about a month ago! And yes, while they are made of wood, they sadly do not make this list of acceptable materials.



Neither of the lists above are all inclusive, so be sure to visit **cuyahogarecycles.org** for more information. And while being mindful of the dos and don'ts of paper recycling can be a pain, it really does make a difference....one sheet at a time!
